

Nurturing Today's Young People,

To achieve great things, we cannot build a Potemkin Village.

In the late 18th century, Catherine the Great annexed Crimea from the Ottoman Empire and asked Grigory Potemkin, a statesman in the Russian Army, to colonise the newly acquired land and build a vibrant community there.

Potemkin failed to achieve what Catherine had asked and the land lay barren. So, when the empress wanted to tour Crimea in her royal barge in 1787, the nobleman had a problem. To save his reputation, Potemkin arranged for fake pasteboard villages to be installed along the journey of Catherine's voyage, along with happy peasants and herds of animals brought in from central Russia.

The myth of the Potemkin Village reminds us that we often try to hide the undesirable reality of our failings and our flaws by erecting temporary facades. We do not accept our mistakes, pretend to work hard or deliver our very best only when others are watching, and put on a fake show of brilliance to get past a difficult moment rather than try to put things right every day to achieve great things.

Like the legend of Crimea in 1787, if we do want to achieve amazing things for ourselves and others, we cannot build a Potemkin Village.

Stop for a moment and notice the beauty around us.

In 2007, on a cold January morning, a man with a violin played classical music at a train station in Washington DC. Around 2000 people passed in the hour that passed. Some noticed him briefly. A few gave money. In total, he raised \$32. Several children stopped to listen and watch but were hurried along by a parent. After an hour of playing, the man stopped. No one noticed and he left.

The man with the violin was Joshua Bell. One of the finest musicians in the world. He had just played one of the most intricate pieces ever written with a violin worth £3.5 million. He had played the same music days before in a sold-out theatre where tickets averaged at \$100 each.

As we hurry in our lives, do we stop and notice the beauty around us? Do we pause to see the magic? Do we let our children marvel at the intricate and delicate awesomeness of our world? Do we help them to appreciate the magic in our classrooms, our homes, and our lives? Do we create these moments for them? Indeed, in their stressful desire to achieve excellent grades and secure the next stage in their studies, do our children miss their unique talent, the divinely inspired gift that they have been given, and the path that would truly make their life one of fulfilment and joy?

If we can slow down a little, lift our heads away from our screens for a while, pause from the daily grind of our work and the preparation for exams for a short moment; if we can truly look at each other as family of our own; if we can pause and notice the quirks that make people around us unique, listen intently to what moves their mind and stirs their soul, watch our young women grow keenly into the beautiful young people we aspire them to be, and chart rather than impose a path forward with them rather than for them...if we can do this, then we will see the beauty in each of our children.

Ramadhaan is a month for everything. It is a month for forgiveness – of each other and of ourselves. It is a month for renewal – of body, of spirit, and of faith. 

One may define an inspirational woman as someone whose impact on society leaves a lasting legacy. Fatima Elizabeth Cates embodies this definition as a beacon of leadership in the Islamic community.

Born in 1865 into a family adherent to strict Catholic beliefs, Cates was determined to change the unstable dynamics in the community and to make a profound impact by rebelling against the prevailing injustices of society.

In 1887, Cates attended a lecture by Abdullah Quilliam, a renowned lawyer who had recently embraced Islam, and she was captivated by his articulate portrayal of Islam. 
